

List of Figures and Tables (if applicable)


Provide a list of figures and tables used in the dissertation with corresponding page numbers.

Useful for easy reference.

Chapter 2: Literature Review

1. Search for Evidence

2. Summary, Critical Evaluation, & Synthesis

 Review existing research on the topic, categorizing and analyzing prior studies.

3. Gaps

 Identify gaps, controversies, or limitations in existing literature.

For example:

- 2.1: Evidence Search
 - 2.1.1 Search Strategy
 - 2.2.2 Search Results
- 2.2: Historical Context
- 2.3: Theme 2
- 2.4: Theme 3 (and so on)
- 2.5: Gaps in Existing Literature
- 2.6: Conclusion & Justification for the Study


Chapter 3: Methodology

- 1. Describe the research methods used in detail.
- 2. Explain the choice of methodology and its alignment with the research questions.
- 3. Discuss data collection techniques, tools, and participants.
- 4. Address ethical considerations and how you obtained informed consent.

For example:

- 3.1: Research Design i.e. approach, research timeline, data sources, participants (population or sample size), sampling strategy.
- 3.2: Data Collection
- 3.3: Data Analysis
- 3.4: Ethical Considerations & Informed Consent
- 3.5: Methodological Limitations

Chapter 4: Results



- 1. Present the research findings; organized according to research questions or hypotheses.
- 2. Use Visuals & Non-textual Elements: Utilize tables, figures, charts, or graphs to illustrate key data.
- 3. Label Each Figure Appropriately i.e. Fig.1.0: (Name)
- 4. Include a Caption (short description) Below Each Figure
- 5. State the Significance of Results (do not interpret!)

\square For example:

- 4.1: Presentation of Findings
 - 4.1.1: [Finding One + Visual (if applicable)]
 - 4.1.2: Same as above and so on
- 4.2: Significance of Results

Chapter 5: Discussion

1. Interpret

- Interpret the results, discussing their implications and relevance to both your research question and broader field context.
- Refer to the results in past tense i.e. "were obtained"

2. Compare

Compare findings to those in studies evaluated in your literature review.

3. Limitations & Future Research

 Acknowledge any limitations and offer recommendations based on the findings (if any).

For Example:

- 5.1: Introduction
- 5.2: (Significant Finding One interpret, discuss implications, & compare to existing literature)
- 5.3: (Repeat 5.2 for all significant findings)
- 5.4: Broader Implications
- 5.5: Limitations of the Study
- 5.6: Recommendations

Chapter 6: Conclusion

- 1. Summarize the key findings, their significance, and the overall contributions of the dissertation.
- 2. Briefly provide practical recommendations, policy implications, or directions for further study.

For example:

- 6.1: Summary of the Research
- 6.2: Key Findings & Implications
- 6.3: Contributions to the Field
- 6.4: Limitations of the Study
- 6.5: Recommendations for Future Research

List all sources and studies cited in the dissertation.

References

Follow a specific citation style (e.g., APA, MLA, Chicago)

Appendix

- □ Contains supplementary materials that support the dissertation but are too extensive to include in the main body. i.e.:
 - Raw data
 - Questionnaires
 - Technical Details i.e. Complex equations, mathematical derivations, or methodological
 - Supporting Documentation: Legal documents & paperwork, Consent forms, IRB approvals, etc.
 - Visuals: Charts, graphs, tables, or images that are too numerous or detailed to be incorporated into the main text.
 - Additional details
- ☐ For example: [Appendix A: Title]
 - Describe the content of each appendix clearly, including any datasets, charts, or additional information.
 - Label appendices with letters (e.g., Appendix A, Appendix B).
